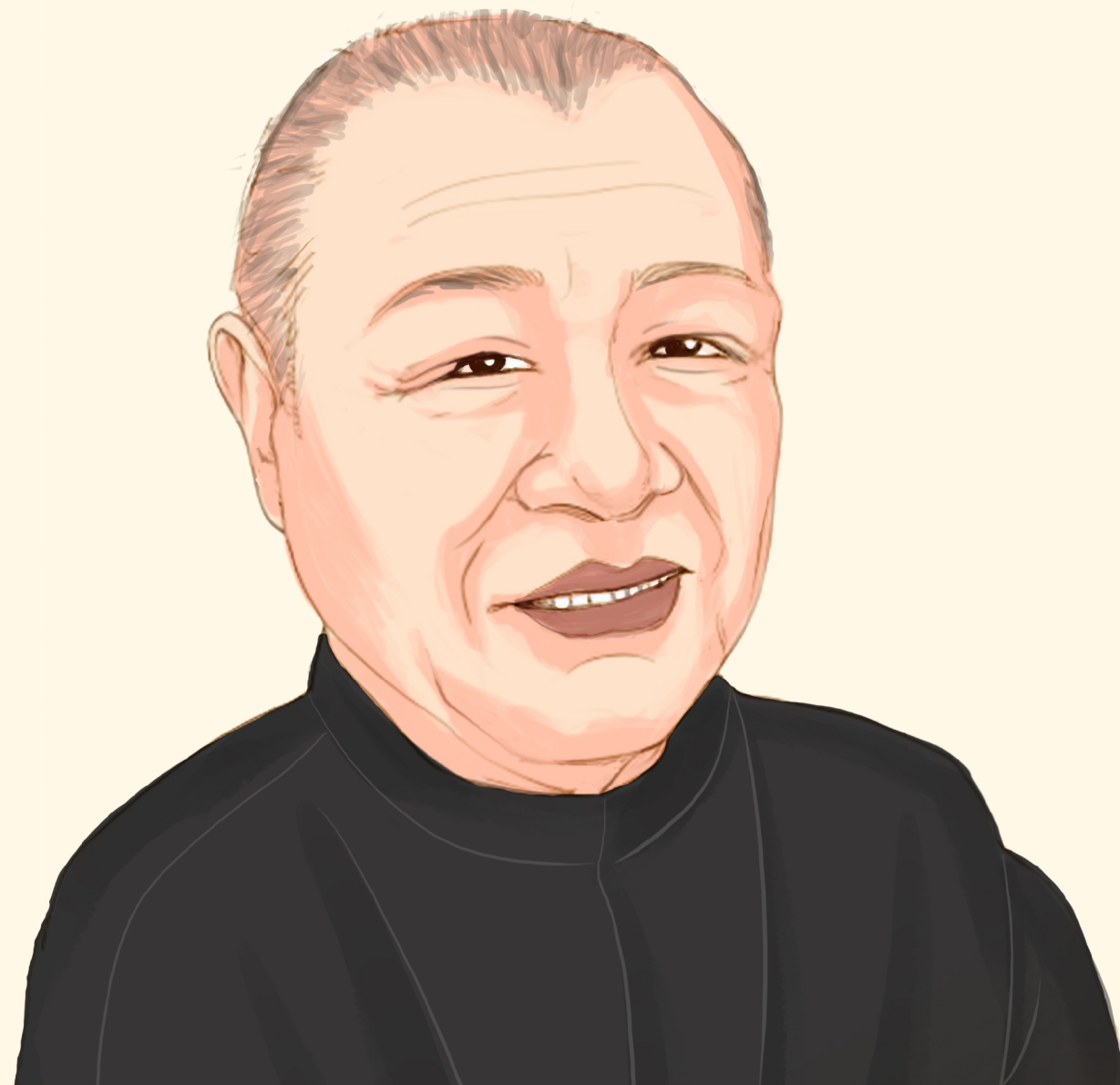

With methodologies drawn from the social sciences, Hsu has transformed historical research into a resource for humanistic education, demonstrating his unwavering public spirit.

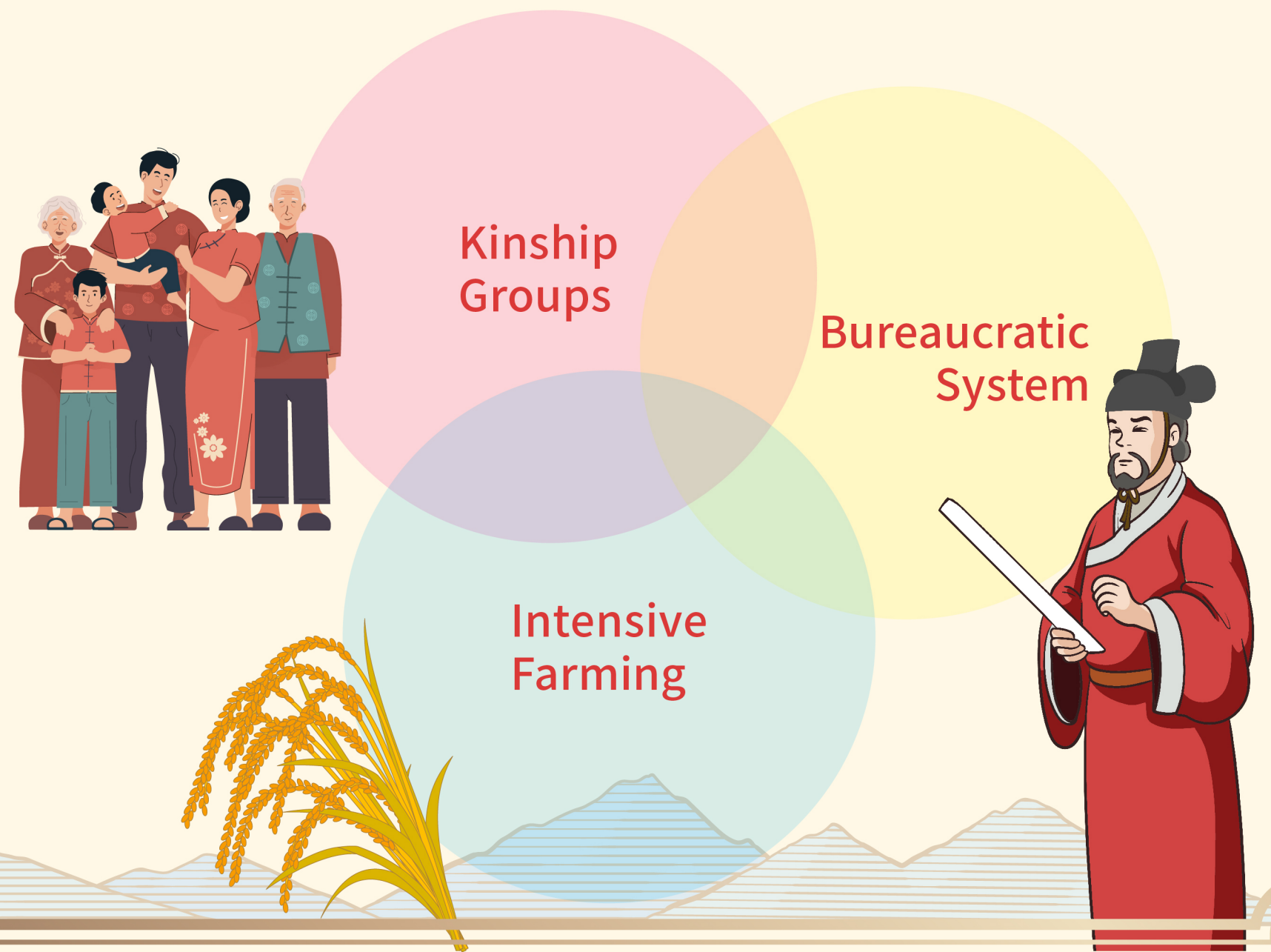


A Historian of Antiquity and Modernity

With his expertise, Professor Hsu critiques political dynamics and institutional transformations from a historical perspective, taking one to look into not only the bygone ages but the present and future.



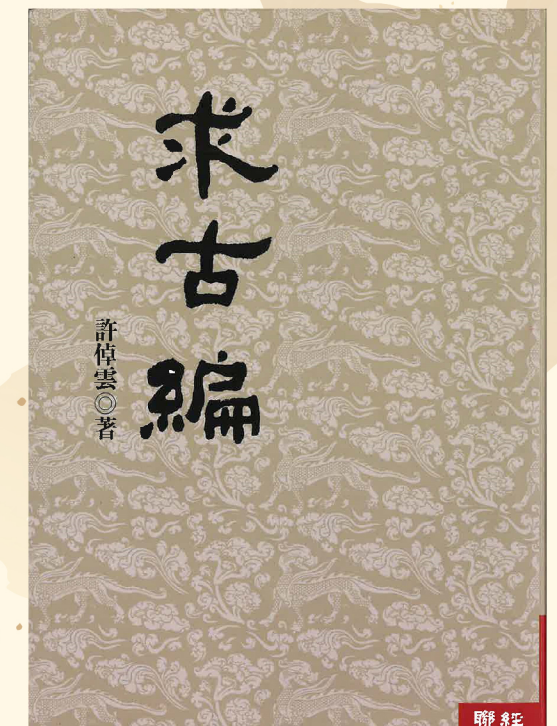
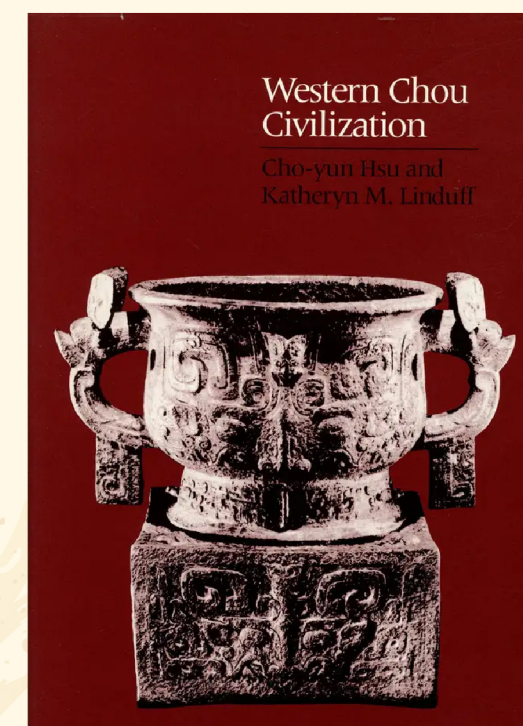
Key Publications You Shouldn't Miss (I)

A New Direction in Chinese History Studies

Xizhou Shi (*Western Chou Civilization*; first published in Chinese in 1984) is the first monograph to focus on the dynastic history of the Western Zhou. The book's unique insight lies in its inquisition of the formation of the *Huaxia* state within "China" at the time, and the continued expansion of its cultural sphere.

Discourses on Institutional Structure Throughout Early China

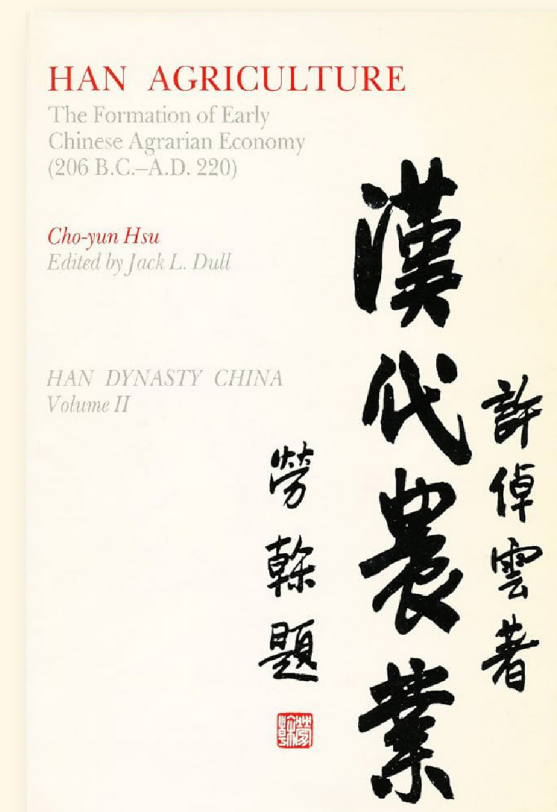
Qiugu Bian [Discovering Antiquity] (1982) deals with the political/social and central/local bureaucratic systems of the Zhou, Qin, and Han periods, which in effect illuminate all eras of early China.



Key Publications You Shouldn't Miss (II)

Exploration into Political and Economic Features of China

Han Agriculture (1980) provides an in-depth analysis of crop varieties, tools and techniques, farming methods, and peasant livelihoods during the Han dynasty. It reveals that the ideology that emphasized agriculture over commerce, government fiscal policies, and land distribution were all critical factors in the stability of an agrarian state such as China.



This magnum opus addresses the crucial transition from a trade and commerce-oriented society to an agrarian state from the Warring States to the early Han period. Professor Hsu's study of "Han agriculture" transcends the "Han dynasty" and "agriculture" alone, offering insights into core themes of Chinese history.

Network Theory and the Pulse of Chinese History

Tangible roads and waterways facilitate not only material circulation and social contact, but also the political and ideological systems.

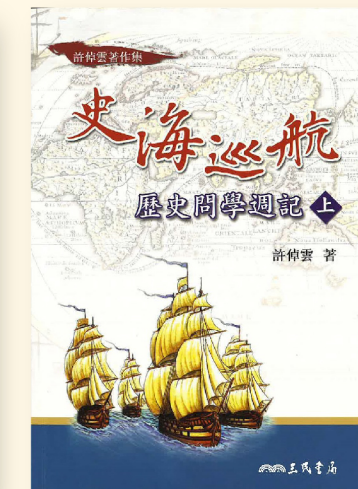
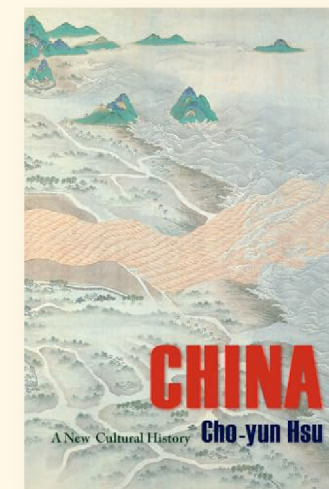
Inseparable from the transportation systems, the interconnected economic, social, political, and ideological aspects form a complex network that has laid the foundation for China's stability.

This is what Hsu terms his "network theory," which provides a practical framework for grand historical analysis.



A Holistic Approach to Chinese History

Professor Hsu spent his early career exploring the essential elements of China through the study of ancient history, and has devoted his later years to writing comprehensive historical narratives.



Notable examples include *China: A New Cultural History*, *Shihai Xunhang* [Voyage on the Sea of History], and *Huaxia Lunshu* [Discourse on the *Huaxia*], which portray Chinese history in the global context, emphasizing the Sino-foreign cultural and intellectual exchanges and integrating China into world civilizations.
